I've taught in country, rural schools, I've taught in small wealthy schools, and I've taught in inner city schools and this book went to every one of them with me. The students at the small, wealthy schools related to Cherry. They felt like no matter what they did, everyone felt like they were snobs – it didn't matter how nice they were. And finally, in the inner city school I taught in, they had a complete and total understanding of TUFF. They knew the importance of reputation and standing up for yourself, even if it means breaking the rules or the law.

In conclusion, I'd like to thank you for this book. Your novel has changed my life and the lives of my students. You have given us a story to share and a history to grow from – and I am extremely thankful to you for that.
